## Long awaited advocacy group for Natives and more

### Milwaukee Inter-ethnic Forum

In June 2012 a Yahoo Groups forum was organized to connect ethnic leaders and active participants in ethnic activities to each other. Currently representatives of Latino, Polish, Jewish, African American, Arab, Slovenian, German, American Indian, Welsh, and pan-African groups are participating.

### Lincoln Avenue: An accessible mosaic

Over the years, Lincoln Avenue, on Milwaukee's Historic South Side, has become a mosaic of ethnic shops offering Mexican, Polish, Serbian, Italian, Chinese, Salvadorian, Sikh, African American, and Peruvian products. The surrounding neighborhood is home to 110 ethnic groups.

Rarely are buildings available on Lincoln Avenue. Today, as the result of family deaths, three beautiful buildings have become available, all leasing for approximately one dollar per square foot. ### *Movement spread from Canada to US to Milwaukee*

Idle No More Milwaukee started organizing in early January 2013. It all started with a Women's Hand Drum group. As the group started practicing together, they also organized.

Idle No More is an international movement that began in late 2012 in Canada by four Women. They came together to be 'idle no more' because of political agendas that go against their tribes. With two goals at

hand, Idle No More Milwaukee demanded the same: (1) Indigenous sovereignty and (2) protection of the land and water. The organization follows the same goals because Wisconsin tribes are also facing similar political agendas that can potentially damage water, cultures, and environment.

### January/February events

The first event was January 18<sup>th</sup>, 2013. Organization members gathered outside of the Grand Avenue Mall in downtown Milwaukee at 11am. A procession marched peacefully through windy downtown Milwaukee all the way to the shores of Lake Michigan at Veteran's Park where they gathered and held a traditional Pipe Ceremony, sang prayers, sang songs, and listened to one another. About 150 people gathered to save our waters and our land.

The second event was February 9<sup>th</sup> at All People's Church with a community discussion and potluck. About 25 adults and a handful of children turned out for delicious food and great conversation. On February 17<sup>th</sup> Idle No More Milwaukee was invited by local Artist and Activist, Sue Simensky Bietila to be part of the first of three Night School talks—Penokee mine resistance—at the Riverwest Public House Cooperative.

### The future

The group has been gathering with several other groups from Madison to Kenosha to the Bad River Tribe's land, listening and moving toward what is needed for Mother Earth. This is not only a 'Native Thing'. Idle No More believes this is *everyone's* movement, especially those who defend the land and water and need the water and land. ## Kościuszko Monument Conservation Underway

Milwaukee's historic monument to Polish hero, General Tadeusz Kościuszko, will soon be getting a much-needed cleaning and repair—its first in 108 years!

### Fundraising effort

Under the leadership of Atty. Claude Krawczyk, the Restore Kościuszko Monument Committee has been working for more than five years to raise the needed funds, and the committee is pleased to announce that the goal of restoring the general to his former glory is finally being realized.

Many people have worked tirelessly to see the project through, and many have given generously. The Lincoln Village Business Association initiated the project originally. Polanki, the Polish Women's Cultural Club of Milwaukee, soon joined the effort to restore a work of art that has special meaning for Milwaukee's Polish community.

Many other organizations, as well as hundreds of individuals, also contributed to the fundraising effort. Additionally, the City of Milwaukee allocated a generous portion of the unexpected legacy it received from Milwaukee Polish American David Dombrowski.

### The restoration

The Restore Kościuszko Monument Committee has contracted with McKay Lodge Conservation Laboratories in Oberlin, Ohio—one of a few firms in the country that routinely handle large-scale conservation projects of this kind. They will remove filler from the legs of Kościuszko's horse, install a new stainless steel armature, repair cracks, and clean the corrosion from the bronze surface.

### Polish hero's birthday

On Tuesday, February 12 (Tadeusz Kościuszko's 267<sup>th</sup> birthday), a local moving firm, Hennes Services, Inc. (4100 Lincoln Ave.), deftly lifted the statue from its granite base and prepared it for transport to the conservation facility. An appreciative crowd of well-wishers and civic leaders was on hand to send the general on his way and join in the birthday celebration. There was even a contingent of students from Kosciuszko Elementary School.

### Rededication ceremony planned

Horse and rider are expected to be back on their pedestal in Kosciuszko Park (9<sup>th</sup> Place and Lincoln Avenue) by the end of summer. A rededication ceremony is being planned, with the date still to be determined. As part of the conservation project, the landscaping around the monument will be upgraded, a permanent memorial to major donors will be erected, and an endowment fund will be established to cover future maintenance costs.

## New ethnic study begins

Between 2000 and 2012, Urban Anthropology Inc. studied over 60 Milwaukee ethnic groups. This resulted in the book, *American Ethnicity in the Early Twentieth Century: The Milwaukee Study* (in press, Lexington).

One finding in the study that called for further research was the topic of work ethics. According to the majority of the 434 informants discussing this topic, first generation Americans hold a stronger work ethic than later generations of the same ethnic group. A follow-up study is now being implemented by Urban Anthropology to compare generations of ethnic groups on the work ethic variable.

## PACA offering second tutoring site on Milwaukee's South Side

The Pan-African Community Association (PACA) is opening a second tutoring site March 4 for refugee young people on the South side of Milwaukee. The site, located at Our Lady Queen of Peace school (3222 S 29th), is an expansion of PACA's tutoring program to increase access to students in the area. PACA currently works with more than 25 students per day at its North side location, providing one-on-one homework help, English tutoring, and extracurricular activities to assist in the adjustment and future success of refugee young people.

*A day of fun for the whole family*



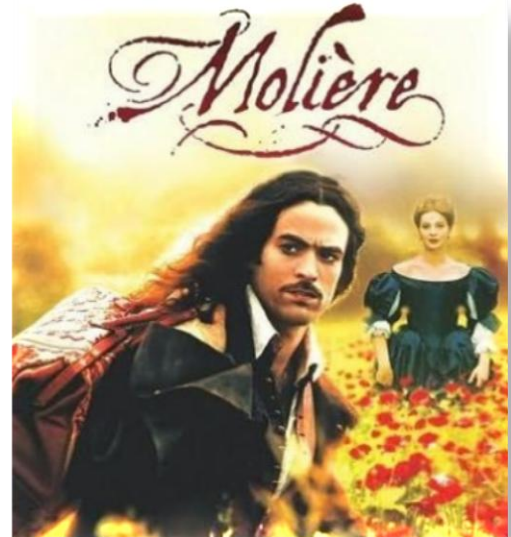

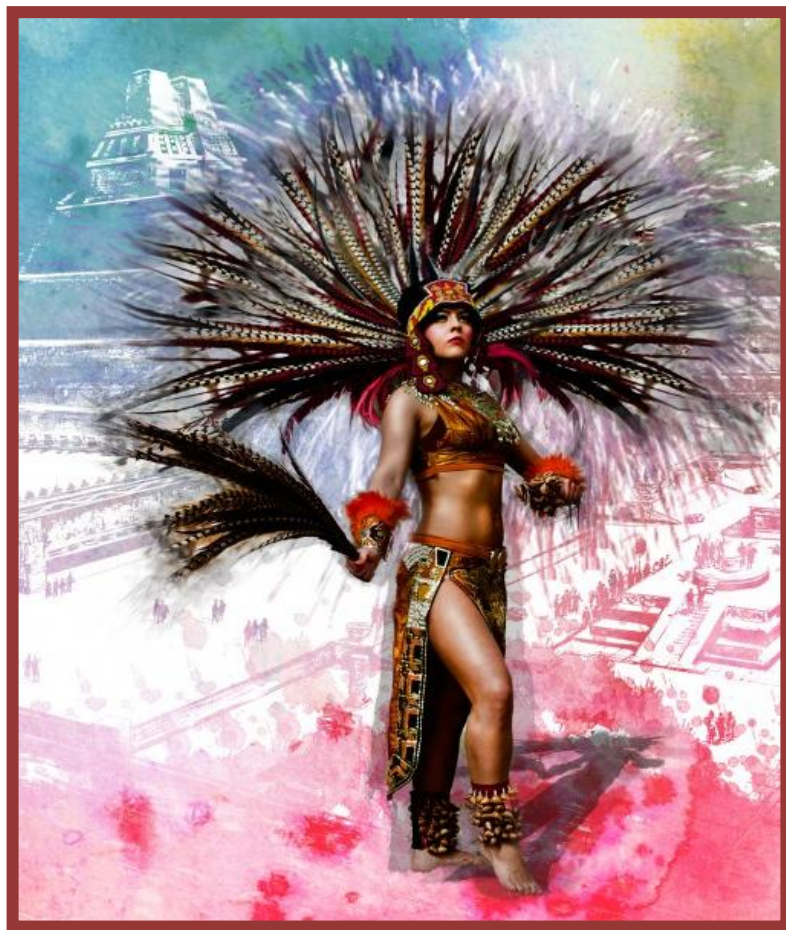
