New neighbors MEET THE JASZEWSKIS



For generations, Lincoln Village was a solidly Polish neighborhood. Some Poles have been rediscovering Lincoln Village, including Chris Jaszewski, a lifetime worker with the homeless and disadvantaged. He and his 83-year old mother, Bernie, moved to 2319 S. 7th recently.

Bernie is a mother of 10, grandmother of 14 and more. She is also a daily activist at Urban Anthropology, the Benedict Center, and the Yoga Society. Why did Chris and Bernie choose Lincoln Village? "I like the park, my neighbors, and had a chance to get a bigger place," Bernie said.

Youth Art Pillar (YAP) will be unveiled on August 31

For the past year staff from Urban Anthropology Inc. have been working with three youth-serving organizations to create a 3-sided pillar on the history of the neighborhood. The pillar will be unveiled at the 7th St./Lincoln entrance to Kosciuszko Park at 4pm Monday on August 31. The public is invited.

<u>Side one: the Natives.</u> Youth at the Ace Boxing Club, with its Ojibwe leadership, designed six tiles on the history of Natives on the Old South Side.

<u>Side two: the Poles.</u> Youth from St. Josaphat School designed six tiles on the settlement of the Poles in Lincoln Village.

<u>Side three: the Mexicans.</u> Youth from Riley Elementary School designed six tiles on the migration and settlement of Mexicans in the neighborhood.

A second pillar is planned for the future and this will celebrate the settlement of Puerto Ricans, Germans, and African Americans in the neighborhood.

A large number of businesses in Lincoln Village and the Pettit Foundation contributed to the effort. The youth artists and the supporters will be recognized at the unveiling.
